Article 4: Shall the District raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant, or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Twelve Million, Six Hundred Eighty Two Thousand, Two Hundred Six Dollars (\$12,682,206)? Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be Twelve Million, Six Hundred Forty Two Thousand, Fifty One Dollars (\$12,642,051), which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the District or by law; or the governing body may hold YES XW one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.
